Terms you may come across at ANU

When you start university, you are bound to come across a number of unfamiliar terms and jargon. We have put together a list of commonly used words you may be using or seeing often at ANU. For more information: anu.edu.au/directories/university-glossary

Academic advisor	Member of ANU college of academic staff responsible for providing guidance to students concerning their programs and/or courses.
Census Date	Your last day to drop courses without any financial and academic penalty, add courses (with permission) and submit any Commonwealth Assistance Form.
CSP	Students with a Commonwealth Supported Place (CSP) have their tuition partially subsidised by the Australian Government. The remaining amount they have to pay is the Student Contribution.
FEE-HELP	A loan scheme to help eligible non-Commonwealth supported students pay their domestic tuition fees (DTF). Australian citizens and holders of a permanent humanitarian visa are eligible for Fee-HELP assistance.
HECS-HELP	Higher Education Contribution Scheme-Higher Education Loan Program (HECS-HELP, but often referred to as HECS) are loans to assist eligible Commonwealth supported students pay their student contribution amounts.
Lecture	A lecture is a large group classes which generally delivered in the form of a talk by an academic responsible for the course.
Major	A set of related courses which are constructed for students to achieve specified learning outcomes and require the completion of 48 units.
Minor	A set of related courses which are structures for students to achieve specific learning outcomes. A minor requires the completion of 24 units.
OS-HELP	A loan available to eligible undergraduate domestic students who undertake some of their program overseas such as through study abroad or exchange.
Tutorial	Tutorials are smaller classes, usually conducted weekly by tutors. They provide opportunities for students to ask questions and discuss their learnings. Most tutorials are compulsory to attend.
Unit	An indicator of the value of the course within the total program. Most courses are valued at 6 units. Units are used to track progress towards completing a plan. Full-time students normally undertake 24 units of courses each semester.
University ID	A seven digit number which uniquely identifies a student or staff member (eg u1234567). This is sometimes referred to as your “u” number or “uid”.

Study essential

In addition to the terms and jargons above, we have also put together a list of study essential terms that you may come accross as you commence your study at ANU.

GPA (Grade Point Average)

GPA stands for Grade Point Average. It is the average result of all grades achieved throughout your degree. Your GPA will be published on your academic transcript. You can check final course results online on ISIS after results release date at the end of the semester.

MyTimetable

Zoom

ISIS is a system that allows you to access your personal and academic information held on the University's student system. This includes enrolment, fees and graduation details. Wattle - Web Access to Teaching and Learning Environment

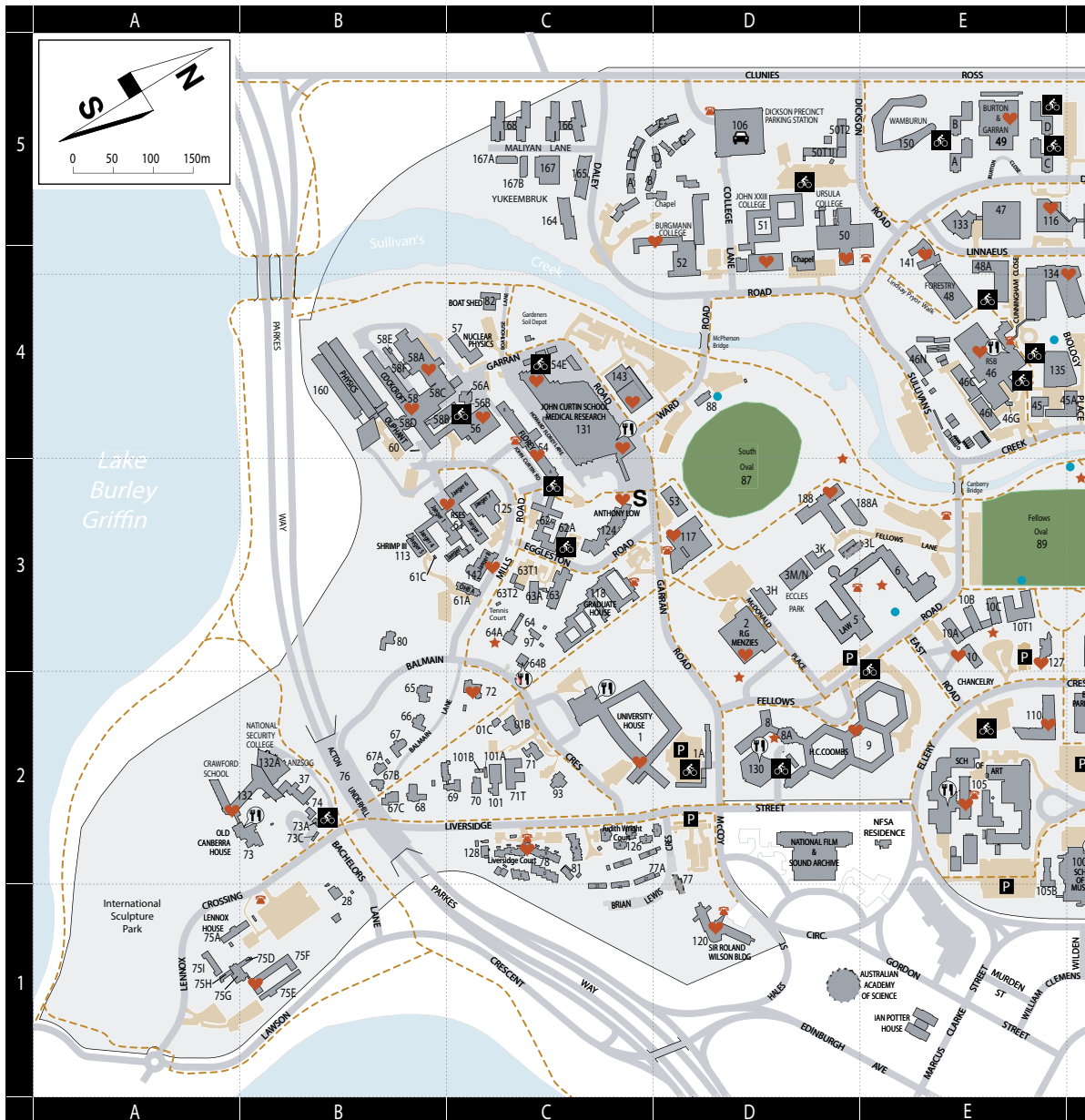

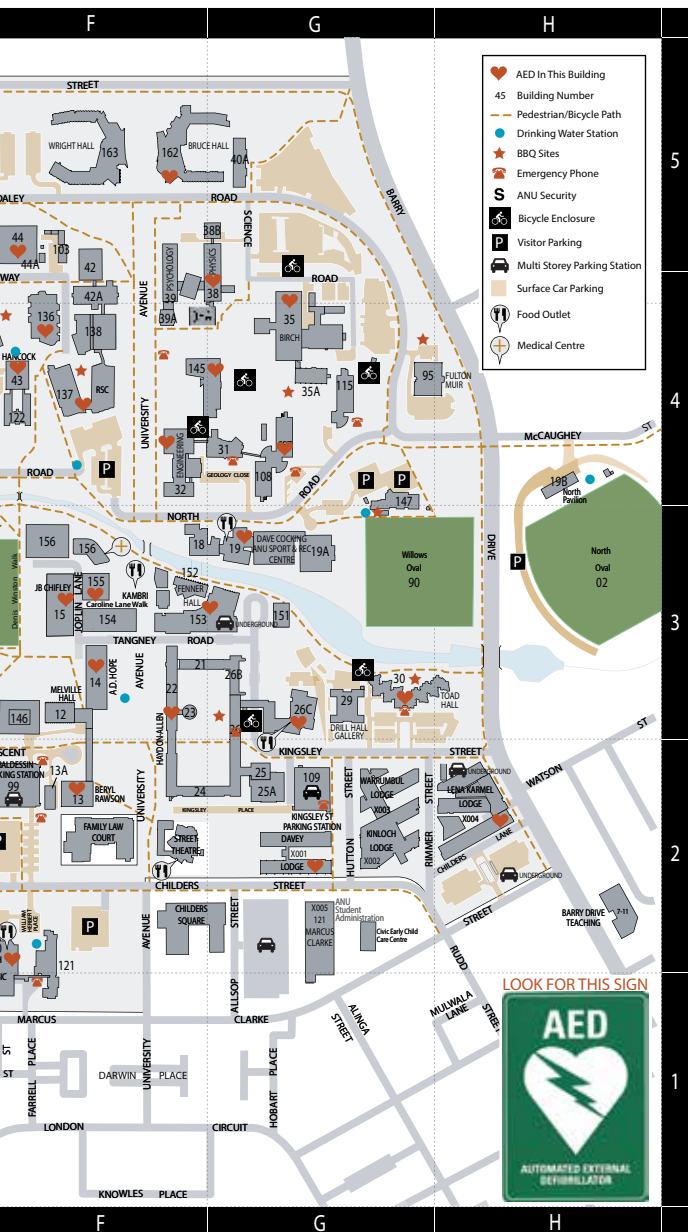

Mental health and wellbeing

Embarking on your new university experience can be exciting yet daunting. You may feel overwhelmed, nervous or even uncomfortable while you are adjusting to your new environment. Find out more about support and resources available at ANU to help you manage your mental health and wellbeing.

What is mental health and how does it affect me?

Mental health includes our emotional, psychological, and social wellbeing. It affects how we think, feel, and act. It also helps determine how we handle stress, relate to others, and make choices (taken from mentalhealth.gov/basics/what-is-mental-health).

Is this something I should be embarrassed about?

No, it is important that you take care of yourself! It is also important to take action and find good support so that you can feel more settled in your new environment.

On arrival in a new country or city, it is common for people to experience culture shock. New experiences can make people feel overwhelmed and homesick. Emotions such as sadness, loneliness, fear, tiredness and confusion can be normal, though at other times you may feel hopeful, pleased, excited, independent and confident.

Financial assistance

Depending on your circumstances, there are a number of financial support options that you might be eligible for. If you are a domestic student, you can also explore financial support options provided by the Australian Government.

Higher Education Loan Program (HELP)

The Higher Education Loan Program (HELP) allows you to defer your payment of university course (HECS) or student amenities (SA) fees until your income is above a minimum repayment threshold.

Services Australia

Services Australia supports Australians by delivering accessible services and payments on behalf of the government. They can assist with a range of services, including Youth Allowance. Youth Allowance is financial help you may be eligible for if you are 24 years old or younger, studying full-time, independent, or living away from home to study, or temporarily unable to study.

Accommodation bursaries

ANU accommodation bursaries are designed to assist full time ANU students, established in permanent accommodation, who are experiencing unexpected financial hardship. Priority may be given to students nearing the end of their studies and needing assistance to complete. All applications are considered by a committee and lodging an application does not guarantee a bursary will be awarded.

Scholarships and grants

In addition to the financial support options above, there are also scholarships and grants offered by ANU. Availability changes as more grants and scholarships are added each year. ANUSA grants and programs

Students can experience unforeseen situations and experience financial challenges during their time at ANU. To assist students in such situations, ANUSA offers a range of grants and programs to eligible students which are not required to be paid back. Information for international students

This section will provide you with more information about your responsibilities and rights as a student visa holder at ANU. It is important to fulfill responsibilities stated on your visa to lawfully stay in Australia. At ANU, the Academic Standards & Quality Office (ASQO) ensures that the University is acting in accordance with relevant legislation.

What are some of my student visa responsibilities?

- You must complete your program within the duration of your program at a full-time load, as stated on your Confirmation of Enrolment (CoE).
- Satisfy Academic Progress requirements and comply with all conditions of your visa.
- Inform ANU of your Australian residential address, mobile phone number, email address and who to contact in emergency situations within 7 days of arriving in Australia. You can add and modify your contact details through isis.anu.edu.au
- Have valid Overseas Student Health Cover (health insurance designed to help you cover the costs of medical and hospital treatment) for the duration of your visa.
- Must maintain an active CoE while studying in Australia.

Can ANU cancel my student visa?

ANU does not grant or cancel your visa. ANU reports changes to your enrolment status to the Government, monitors enrolment to ensure compliance with certain student visa conditions and provides you with a CoE to apply for a student visa.

The Department of Home Affairs has the authority to issue and cancel visas. If you have specific questions and concerns about your visa or your entitlements, contact the Department of Home Affairs directly: homeaffairs.gov.au/help-and-support/contact-us

ANUSA Legal Service:

ANUSA offers a free and confidential legal service to undergraduate students at the ANU, including visa advice. More information can be found here: anusa.com.au/services/legal/



Check your visa condition online with VEVO

VEVO allows visa holders to check their visa entitlements and conditions online. You can use VEVO to send proof of your visa to others, for example your future employers, landlords, government and other institutions. For more information, visit Home Affairs's website.

What happens if I drop to part-time study?

You are expected to complete your program within the dates listed on your CoE. The program start and end dates listed on your CoE corresponds with how long it will take to complete your program as a full-time student.

If you reduce your study load, you will not be able to complete your program at the standard full-time load (24 units per study period) meaning that you may not be able to complete your program prior to your visa expiring. There are limited situations and circumstances in which you may be able to modify your study load.

Can I extend the program duration on my eCoE?

There are limited situations and circumstances in which you may be allowed to have an extended study duration on your electronic Confirmation of Enrolment (eCoE). In most cases you will receive a new Confirmation of Enrolment for this extension. Circumstances where you may be eligible:

- Compassionate or compelling circumstances (e.g. documented medical illness, documented death in the family etc.). Evidence is required with any application under compassionate and compelling grounds.
- Where a formal early intervention has been implemented for students at risk and this has resulted in the University recommending a reduced study load.
- Where an approved deferment or suspension of study (Leave of Absence) has been granted.
- If you have failed a course and will be unable to complete your program within the duration of your current eCoE (subject to approval from your Academic College).

Does ANU report on International Students to the Government?

ANU must report information about international student visa holders to the Commonwealth Government. By law, the University must report breaches of your student visa conditions, including on the following:

- Non-enrolment
- Failure to satisfy course academic progress requirements
- Misbehaviour by a student
- Non-commencement of study
- Non-payment of tuition fees
- Withdrawal from study
